*At the heart of what we do, the South Saskatchewan Community Foundation (SSCF) acts as a bridge between donors and charities to create and maintain strong community in southern Saskatchewan for years to come. We thoughtfully and strategically connect the generosity of donors with the needs of the community to address the critical issues and to advance the work of the charitable sector for a lasting impact.*

### 2017 HIGHLIGHTS:

- ✓ With an endowment pool of just over \$71 million, SSCF supported more than 195 registered charities and granted \$6.2 million in 2017. This community support is a huge step forward from our roots of approximately \$60,000 in 1969.
- ✓ The extensive list of grant recipients (pages 12-15) shows the diversity of the community impact achieved. Each project contributes to well-being and belonging in unique ways.
- ✓ The Foundation implemented its new investment policy, and revised its community granting process, while looking at additional ways of community engagement.
- ✓ Community engagement throughout each process is key. The Foundation participates in the national *Vital Signs*® program, an effort that leverages local knowledge to measure the vitality of our communities and to support action aimed at improving our collective quality of life. We appreciate the work of a diverse range of stakeholders, the *Vital Signs* Community Advisory Council, who help share community knowledge and contribute to such efforts as our first Vital Conversation in 2017. More Vital Conversations will be organized and a full *Vital Signs* report will be released in 2018.

With this important year now as a chapter in our history, we look for ways to embrace diversity and inclusivity, to re-envision what community means, and to encourage philanthropy and meet community needs not just in Regina, but across southern Saskatchewan.

We appreciate your continued trust and support in building community, together, forever, for all to enjoy and prosper. We look forward to the year ahead and to celebrating our 50th anniversary with you in 2019.

# Vital Conversation – Pursuing Reconciliation

INAUGURAL EVENT FEATURES LECTURE AND FACILITATED SESSIONS

*In our 2016 Vital Signs report, SSCF identified “Pursuing Reconciliation” as a key theme related to belonging in the province.*

When we come together to learn and share, new ways of respectfully moving forward can evolve and everyone benefits.

In October 2017, SSCF held its inaugural Vital Conversation on the subject of “Pursuing Reconciliation.” Members of the community gathered to hear journalist and columnist Doug Cuthand deliver a keynote lecture. The lecture was followed by facilitated conversations. The objective of the event was to educate on reconciliation, to engage participants in an opportunity to share knowledge and stories about the importance of pursuing reconciliation, as well as to obtain qualitative input for the 2018 *Vital Signs* report. Thank you to the Regina Public Library for their generosity as hosts, our partner, Praxis Consulting for their expertise in facilitating the conversations and gathering

the data, and to Reconciliation Regina for their help in aligning efforts to generate momentum around this topic.

SSCF believes in building our future as a community through dialogue and the power of philanthropy.

In 2017, some SSCF grants related to “Pursuing Reconciliation” included various grants to Carmichael Outreach Inc. for a total of \$26,500 as well as the generosity of the Drs. Lewis and Elisabeth Brandt Trust Fund, which granted \$4,850 in scholarships to students of the First Nations University of Canada and \$2,425 to support the operations of Inuit Tapiriit Kanatami, an organization that works to improve the health and wellbeing of Inuit through research, advocacy, public outreach, and education.

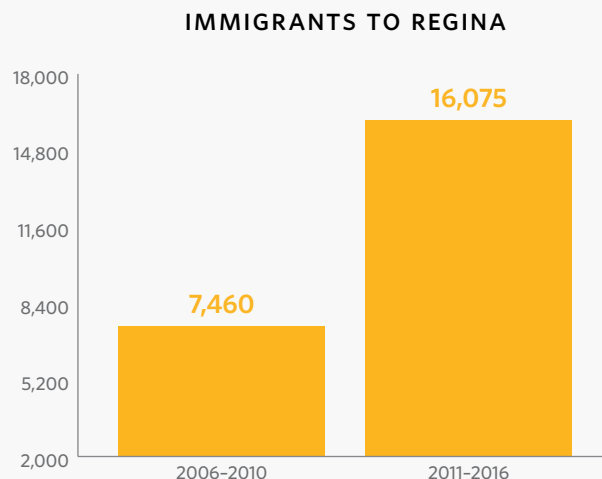
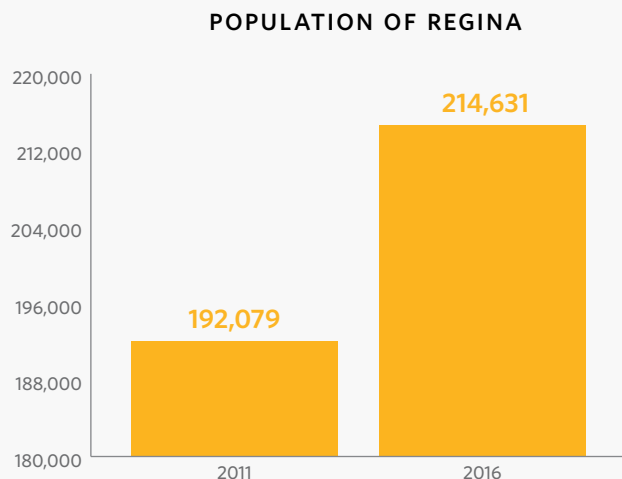

# Welcoming Newcomers

## INITIATIVES AIM TO WELCOME NEWCOMERS



From 2011 to 2016, the population of Regina grew by 11.7%, increasing from 192,079 in 2011 to 214,631 in 2016.

The number of immigrants more than doubled from the 2006-2010 to 2011-2016 period, from 7,460 to 16,075, respectively.

Considering the vast number of newcomers Regina has welcomed in recent years, it was more than fitting, then, that the second sub-theme of SSCF's 2016 *Vital Signs*, which centered on belonging, was "Welcoming Newcomers." In 2017, SSCF's granting worked to address the many needs of newcomers to the city.

For example, a multi-language classroom library was launched at Deshayes Catholic School thanks to the United Way of Regina, the Community Fund for Canada's 150th, and the generous donors from the G. Murray and Edna Forbes Foundation Fund at SSCF. These multi-language books are in English and another language. Thus, they teach English reading skills, introduce students to new languages and cultures, and provide them the familiar feeling of reading their ethnic language in the classroom.

A \$3,200 grant to the Multicultural Council of Saskatchewan Inc. came from the Lynn and Jim Tomkins Foundation Fund at SSCF in partnership with the Community Fund for Canada's 150th to support the making of a video project titled "National Highway to Harmonious Canada."

The Regina Open Door Society Inc. received a total of \$60,000 from various funds, including the G. Murray and Edna Forbes Foundation Fund, the Derril McLeod Family Foundation Fund, and the Welcome Fund – a fund established by the Community Foundations of Canada with the purpose of carrying out charitable activities that will support newcomers to the Regina community with their immediate and long-term needs.

# Economic Inclusion

## MEETING NEEDS CREATES A SENSE OF BELONGING

*Building true economic inclusion in Regina and in Saskatchewan requires addressing multiple variables that cause exclusion. These include poverty, homelessness, hunger, housing affordability, and many more.*

In our 2016 *Vital Signs* report, SSCF identified “Building Economic Inclusion” as a crucial theme related to belonging in this province. That report stated that “when we address the needs of those who struggle to make ends meet, we create opportunities for them to participate, belong and contribute to our community.”



The Marian Centre was one of two Regina soup kitchens supported by SSCF Donors.

Through its 2017 granting, SSCF has worked to address these needs and to foster belonging. For example, in December 2017, the G. Murray and Edna Forbes Foundation Fund at SSCF donated \$43,750 to the Food Banks of Saskatchewan Corporation to help food banks throughout the province address food insecurity. As a part of its 2017 Christmas donation matching campaign, Nutrien matched this generous grant for a total donation of \$87,500. Thank you to Nutrien, the generous donors of the G. Murray and Edna Forbes Foundation Fund at SSCF and everyone at food banks throughout the province for helping to reduce Saskatchewan’s food insecurity.

Many other great charitable initiatives received grants from SSCF’s donors. They include soup kitchens like Souls Harbour Rescue Mission Inc. (\$29,500) and the Marian Centre (\$10,000); an anonymous donation of \$130,000 to the Rainbow Youth Centre Inc.; and \$11,250 to the Regina Anti-Poverty Ministry from the G. Murray and Edna Forbes Foundation Fund.

In 2001, Randall Moffat donated \$100 million dollars to the Winnipeg Foundation to create the Moffat Family Fund. This fund, as Mr. Moffat explains, represents a vision for “a Canadian society where all individuals have equal opportunities to develop their potential” and is directed to programs giving children and families an equal chance in society and is designated for distribution

in communities where the Moffat family operated their media businesses. Moose Jaw was one of these communities.

In 2017, SSCF worked to match Community Fund for Canada’s 150th funding with grants from the Moffat Family Fund. A total of \$81,680 was granted to the following Moose Jaw charities: Joe’s Place Youth Centre-Generation Hope Youth Inc., Creative Kids Canada Inc., Hunger in Moose Jaw Inc., Moose Jaw Association for Community Living, Moose Jaw Multicultural Council Inc., Moose Jaw Art Museum Incorporated, Roots of Empathy Moose Jaw, Saskatchewan Festival of Words Inc., and the YMCA of Moose Jaw.

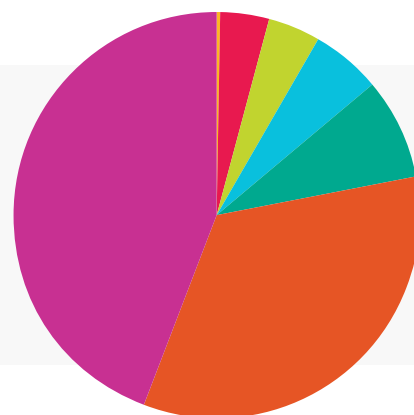


# Community Impact
