The Fund was established in 1992. For the first time since the Fund's inception, South Saskatchewan Community Foundation (SSCF) handled the administration and distribution of the proceeds.

The money raised goes to support Regina Transition House, SOFIA House, WISH Safe House and YWCA Regina Isabel Johnson Shelter.

SSCF extends appreciation to Brenda Indzeoski, Leader-Post's local marketing co-ordinator, for her dedication and integral efforts in every administrative transition stage after the Leader-Post Foundation's dissolution.

"We are forever grateful for the legacy the Leader-Post Foundation has left to the Regina Leader-Post Cheer Fund and for the amazing support our community of readers provide year after year. The funds go a long way in helping women and children who need it," says Indzeoski.

SSCF also thanks Leader-Post Sports Editor Rob Vanstone for his work raising public awareness of the Fund.

"It was a great pleasure to work with the wonderful people at the South Saskatchewan Community Foundation, to whom we are all so grateful," says Vanstone. "Even in the midst of a global pandemic, contributions to the Leader-Post Christmas Cheer Fund actually increased over last year, in no small part due to the assistance and generosity of Donna Ziegler and everyone at the SSCF. I look forward to enhancing that relationship and dealing with everyone at the SSCF for years to come."











Applications are now being accepted for the Canada Healthy Communities Initiative (CHCI) grants program.

This new federal initiative is designated for enhancing and creating vibrant and accessible public spaces. \$31M will be invested across Canada, administered by the Community Foundations of Canada.

Saskatchewan will receive over \$976,000 in funding through the initiative. Non-profit organizations, charities, Indigenous communities, and local governments are invited to apply online through Saskatoon Community Foundation.

CHCl is focused on public spaces which encourage a sense of belonging and collective identity, increasingly important in the face of the COVID-19 pandemic. It will help communities:

- · create safe and vibrant public spaces,
- · improve mobility options, and
- provide innovative digital solutions to connect people and improve health.

Funding applications for the CHCI first phase may be submitted between February 9, 2021 and March 9, 2021. A second round of applications is expected to take place in May 2021.

Hunger in Moose Jaw Adapts During COVID-19

Hunger In Moose Jaw received funding from the Moffat Family Fund in 2020 for their Child Nutrition Milk Program, which delivers lunches daily to children in 18 schools in Moose Jaw.

When schools closed in March 2020 due to COVID-19, Hunger In Moose Jaw adapted their program within two weeks to continue to get nutritional food into the hands of children who need it.

"We moved to a lunch bag program where we prepared a week worth of lunch supplies for the children which included a block of cheese and a jug of milk. We were able to contactless deliver directly to families until the end of June. We even continued to provide the program for 125 children during the summer months... We supported children in a whole new way that we couldn't even dream is possible, but we made it work," says Sharla Sept, Executive Director of Hunger in Moose Jaw.

Despite the challenges that came with adapting the program, Hunger in Moose Jaw has seen some positive outcomes because of the changes.

"We've been able to have more contact with the families. When we deliver lunches into schools, we don't actually see those families. With the direct deliveries, we got to see families, get their feedback, and hear how grateful they were for the program. We're also serving new families who have faced challenges or job loss since the beginning of the pandemic," says Sept.

Sharla also wants to send a message of appreciation to the Moffat Family Fund, saying "We can't do this program and provide meals to children without this funding. It would be impossible. We owe a HUGE thanks to them for supporting this program."


RBC Future Launch Community Challenge

The youth leaders also participated in a group discussion regarding youth leadership, challenges, and solutions to overcome those challenges.

Following the conversation, Sheila Berner, Community Education Liaison at Stoughton Central School, said, "What I took away from the meeting was a better sense of how the youth in our community are feeling during these challenging times and what barriers they are facing. It was valuable to have the feedback from the SSCF and RBC representatives, they shone a light on some of the resources that are available out there and how we can use them to help the youth in our communities."

SSCF Awards \$344,953 in Grants

Through Round 2 of the Emergency Community Support Fund

Round 1 of ECSF was distributed over the summer and Round 2 launched on October 5, 2020. Funding for FLAMES Education Program for At-Risk Adults

Ignite Adult Learning Corporation has been empowering at-risk adults in Regina to reach their academic, employment, and personal goals for over 30 years.

This critical work has been supported by the Government of Canada ECSF grant of \$55,149.

Over 25 weeks, its program, known as "FLAMES," offers a wide range of program services, including GED preparation, employment and computer skills, SMART Addiction Recovery, personal development, financial and wellness education and SGI driver training. They also provide individualized support with food security, housing, mental health, and many other challenges that their students encounter.

Because of the pandemic, the FLAMES education program for at-risk adults went from 100% in-person delivery to a blend of online learning and COVID-compliant in-person activities. This change allows staff and students to teach and learn safely during the pandemic.

Dellice Saxby, Executive Director of Ignite Adult Learning Corporation, says that the students report that the skills and strategies they develop during the program are beneficial. It enables them to succeed in getting their GED and reaching their goals after graduation.

"I think the most important part of what we do is provide a safe space for our students to learn and grow. Our students know that we are on their team and that we will support them as they reach for their goals," says Saxby.
