A Message from our **Executive Director**

Growing the community giving movement throughout 2023 and beyond.

Even with the economic challenges of investments in 2022, I'm pleased to say our Foundation, with the support of an incredible community of donors, returned over \$6.5 million back to community. As a matter of fact, **over our** 53 year history, nearly \$60 million has been returned to community thanks to SSCF donors!

Despite the fantastic return of dollars to community in 2022, we learned that economic challenges continue to hamper programs, services and operations of charities post-COVID. Our competitive grants this year were well oversubscribed by almost double the applicants. Our most recent Truth & Reconciliation Fund grant deadline had over triple the amount of requests compared to the dollars available for the deadline. We are also regretful to announce that the South Saskatchewan Vital Community Fund grant opportunity will not be accepting applications during 2023. This is due to a lack of funds as a result of recent economic challenges with investments. This means that the need to strengthen funding capacity will be even greater this year than in recent years.

One way we hope to strengthen that capacity and grow community giving is through our online grant catalogue. This spring, the grant catalogue will be open for public donors to learn about the emergent needs in their community and to fund them directly through SSCF's online donation portal. We are asking charities to apply to the grant catalogue in lieu of the Vital Community Fund. We are encouraging donors, new and old, to seek out and support these well deserving charitable causes.

Lastly, SSCF staff will be holding a series of informational events for the public throughout 2023. I would like to personally invite you to these events, which you can view a full list of on the last page of this newsletter. We look forward to seeing you and finding ways that we can grow community giving, together and forever.





Over \$6.5 Million Given Back to 219 Charities Throughout 2022

Generous donors, through partnership with SSCF, returned \$6,594,329.20 back to 219 charities throughout 2022. This total equals over \$2 million more than what was returned in 2021.

Donors who give back to their community with SSCF impact many community needs by funding charities to deliver essential programs. This includes, but is not limited to, focus areas of addictions, food security, shelter, children and youth, women and family safety, arts and culture, animal welfare, environmental needs, and healthcare.

Donna Ziegler, Executive Director at SSCF, expressed tremendous gratitude towards the community impact that donors and charities are creating across the region.

"Thank you to the donors, the charities, and the many acts of kindness that have made a difference for someone else. Because of your generosity, and those that came before us, the Foundation will continue to help community today, tomorrow, and for many years to come."

Donna went on to explain that SSCF has ambitious goals to make an even bigger impact on their community. She said, 'it was amazing for me to realize that we increased our granting amount by over \$2 million in 2022. However, we know that the community's needs far outweigh our capacity to serve them. While we saw more money out the door, we also saw record amounts of charities seeking competitive grants through SSCF in 2022."

SSCF will be seeking more donors, partnerships and resources in 2023 to continue to grow the moment of charitable giving across south Saskatchewan.

Acknowledging Presence On Treaty Land

IMPORTANT NOTE: TRUTH & RECONCILIATION FUND 2023 DEADLINE & CRITERIA CHANGES

Due to an overwhelming demand during the first round of the Fund, the Truth & Reconciliation Fund will only be accepting applications for one more round of funding in 2023 and SSCF has updated the guidelines and criteria of the grant opportunity.

April 17, 2023 will be the final funding deadline. The initially planned deadlines for July 17 and October 16 will not occur.

Upcoming Grant Deadlines

Moffat Family Fund

Its primary goal is to support and advance the economic, social, physical and intellectual well-being of children and families.

The majority of the Moffat Family Fund grants have focused on support for children, youth (teens and young adults) and families. In more recent years the Fund has broadened its focus. For example, in some communities, it has supported initiatives that address addiction and mental health, including access to addiction treatment for both youth and adults.

Grant Amount: \$1,000 to \$20,000 (average grant is \$3,000)

Grant Deadline: February 28, 2023

The Lorne and Evelyn Johnson Foundation

Grants are made to promote social, cultural, religious, and other activities deemed beneficial to communities in southern Saskatchewan with priority given to the City of Regina. Grants often focus on supporting outreach to those in need, providing educational opportunities, and supporting the arts.

Grant Amount: \$5,000 to \$15,000

Grant Deadline: March 1, 2023

Truth & Reconciliation Fund: Round 2

The fund is intended to address programs that will help advance the Truth & Reconciliation Calls to Action in the areas of Education, Culture and Language. For example, this may include opportunities for children, youth and families to reconnect to their culture by providing opportunities such as workshops, events, classes that offer individuals and families connection to Elders, communities, and the Land.

Grant Amount: Up to \$25,000

Grant Deadline: April 17, 2023

Vital Community Fund Postponed for 2023

We anticipate the grant opportunity to return for the regular scheduled deadline in 2024.

Call for Support

Seeking Partnerships to Grow the Truth & Reconciliation Fund



The first ever Truth & Reconciliation Fund grant opportunity launched with deadlines throughout 2023.

In November, 2022, SSCF along with its Truth & Reconciliation Fund (TRF) committee launched the first competitive grant process for the Truth and Reconciliation Fund to run throughout 2023.

Initially, approximately \$275,000 was designated to grant out quarterly throughout 2023. However, by the first grant deadline in January of 2023, over \$600,000 was requested by 22 organizations with projects related to the Truth & Reconciliation Calls to Action. This is over double the amount of funds available to grant in 2023 and has resulted in the TRF committee reducing the amount of grant deadlines from four to two throughout 2023.

A great amount of community impact is being made, but a gap exists that needs to be filled.

Following the January 2023 grant deadline, \$122,635.15 has been granted back to 11 charitable organizations working directly towards Truth & Reconciliation.

However, due to the exceptionally high the demand of the first grant deadline alone, over approximately \$480,000 towards essential charitable needs for Indigenous communities has gone unfunded.

This \$480,000 gap means that important projects are without financial support in areas including:


- Connecting youth in need to their Indigenous culture and language;
- Rejuvenating and restoring Indigenous languages;
- · Finding truth by uncovering unmarked graves;
- Reconnecting with and conserving Indigenous land;
- · Infrastructure for remote Indigenous communities;
- and Indigenous-led education and training for staff, community members, and students.

SSCF has committed funding for the Truth & Reconciliation Fund for 2023 and 2024, but we are seeking the partnerships and supports of donors and businesses to grow this opportunity far into the future.

Regina & Area Sexual Assault Centre's "Prevent It" Program Receives \$2.5K

In 2022, Regina & Area Sexual Assault Centre (RSAC) was granted \$2,500 through the South Saskatchewan Vital Community Fund for their "Prevent It" program.

The centre aims to reduce and eliminate the impacts of sexual violence in the communities they serve through education, support and advocacy. The "Prevent It" program was a pilot project summer camp for youth to address the risks of sexual violence.

Brianna Taylor, Counsellor at RSAC, explains, "We actually partnered with Little Warriors and Safe Places. They had been developing a curriculum throughout COVID that could be offered online for teens and kids... We selected a few of their modules to pilot and ran two separate sessions throughout the summer."

It created this environment where it was safe and felt comfortable to discuss some of the preventative education that sometimes feels really big and scary for kids. By the end of our program we had parents reaching out to us saying that it was their kids' favourite camp of the summer and this offered a really good foundation for them to continue to have some of these conversations about prevention, healthy relationships, mental health and consent at home.

She says, "Non-profits work on pretty tight budgets, so when we want to run programs like this that need a little additional boost to funding to be able to offer... it was so important and we are so thankful."
