



The Evolution of Care Goes Full-Circle

Estate of Robert & Carol Hamilton

arol and Robert Hamilton were a young, newly married couple when Carol was diagnosed with Hodgkin's lymphoma in 1962.

Her treatment included radiation using the revolutionary cobalt-60 therapy unit which was created at the University of Saskatchewan in 1951 by medical physicist Dr. Harold Johns.

Carol was fortunate that treatment from this lifesaving, but newly discovered, technology was successful. She went on to have three healthy children and live a full life until she was diagnosed with brain cancer which led to her passing in 2006.

Sadly, Robert was diagnosed with leukemia in 2005 while caring for his beloved Carol, but lived another 14 years with successful treatments and care at the Saskatoon Cancer Centre. When he passed in 2019, his children discovered he left a gift in his Will of \$75,000 to support cancer care in Saskatchewan, His children believed this very significant donation was made in honour of Carol and the great care she received at the Saskatoon Cancer Centre.

"Our dad worked so hard to build up assets. For him to give this amount to cancer care in Saskatchewan shows how much helping the next generation meant to him," said Brad Hamilton, son of Robert and Carol.

Robert and Carol's children directed the donation to the 4D CT Simulator Community Campaign because they knew how important radiation therapy can be in treating cancer. Unlike the cobalt-60 that provided radiation therapy to their mom in 1962, this new technology produces precise imaging for even more targeted radiation treatments.

Robert and Carol's gift is truly full-circle.

"I think it's very, very important to realize that your legacy gift can really help the next generation to be healthier. I know that's what dad wanted," said Brad.

or PTI Transformers, giving back is a key part of the company's mission. From its humble beginnings in a backyard garage more than 30 years ago, to a company with more than 350 employees and offices in Regina and Winnipeg today, PTI Transformers remains a community-focused and family-focused company.

"PTI has been there for us as a family, so it's important that we give back in a way that benefits people in our communities," said George Partyka, Chairman, and co-founder of PTI Transformers.

"My partner and I decided years ago that we should try and give back — and this is what we did," says George.

Just one example of PTI's community involvement is a \$75,000 gift to the Cancer Foundation of Saskatchewan's 4D CT Simulator Community Campaign.

"So many people we know have been impacted by cancer, so we thought it would be an important campaign to support."

Unknown at the time, PTI's donation to the 4D CT Simulator Community Campaign would play a critical role in the cancer care provided to George's wife, Janet. She received a 4D CT simulation as part of her treatment following her cancer diagnosis in January of 2021.

George and Janet believe the Cancer Foundation of Saskatchewan is critical to enhancing quality cancer care in the province. Their children, George Partyka Jr. and Jamie Carlson, are of the same mind. As they step up to take on the leadership of PTI Transformers, George knows both the business and the community are in good hands.

or many women facing an end of life cancer diagnosis, dreaming can feel impossible. In 2011, Cameco, the Saskatchewan Roughriders and the Saskatchewan Cancer Agency partnered to change that, and the Cameco Riders Touchdown for Dreams program was born.

Over the past ten years Cameco Riders Touchdown for Dreams, managed by Cameco and quietly supported by a wide variety of businesses and individuals across the province, has helped make dreams come true for more than 70 women and their families.

"These are families with incredible battles in front of them. We wanted to make a difference in their lives," said Jonathan Huntington, Vice-President, Sustainability and Stakeholder Relations for Cameco. It's a program like no other in the country. Huntington believes it works because it's in Saskatchewan.

For ten years the partnership, which added the Cancer Foundation of Saskatchewan in 2019, has fulfilled dreams ranging from swimming with dolphins to renovated kitchens.

In 2021, a 16-year-old cancer patient's dream was to have the family car repaired so she could travel to her treatment appointments. The program secured a new road-ready SUV for her for the next two years, so her family could travel worry-free.

Another dream recipient, a young mother of a young child, dreamed of having her kitchen repainted. Cameco employees volunteered to help. They painted her kitchen, organized a yard makeover, and put up a swing set and a playset for her daughter in the backyard.



"We have stayed involved in Cameco Riders Touchdown for Dreams because our employees want to be involved with it. We have to turn away Cameco employees every year who want to participate," he said.

A dream of a renovated kitchen, which exceeded the program's per participant budget, was realized when home builders and volunteers stepped up to help, resulting in a complete renovation.

Funding for the program comes from Cameco and from the sale of pink items sold during one October Riders game each year, affectionately known as the Pink Game. Huntington says the program has worked really well for 10 years, largely because of support from Riders fans.

Fans, who normally bleed green, eagerly purchase pink toques, scarves or whatever unique item is featured that year.

"Last year we were sold out 30 minutes before kick-off! We were stunned by the overwhelming demand, so this year we have increased our pink gear by 50%," he said.

All the surviving past participants of the Cameco Riders Touchdown for Dreams program, and the widowers of those participants that have passed on, are invited back to the Pink Game. Cameco hosts the current and past program participants, and the annual event has created a sort of new family for these participants.

Huntington, who has been involved in organizing every year of the program over the past decade says it has been a tremendous experience.

"This isn't about corporate sponsorship — this is about trying to make their lives better."

Impacting Cancer Patients Locally



4-H Auction for 4D Technology

t was August 2020 when 44-year-old Jody Woytiuk, a farmer from the Shell Lake area, was diagnosed with stage 3 stomach cancer.

Scared of what this meant for her husband, Jackie Woytiuk received some hope from his oncologists. "He was fortunate to be put on a new form of chemotherapy which improved his chances of survival from less than 30% to more than 50%," said Jackie.

Following the chemo treatments, Jody underwent surgery to remove one-third of his stomach and two-thirds of his esophagus.

Jody and Jackie's daughter, Olivia, wanted to give back to the organization that helped to save her dad's life. As the head of the Wild Rose 4-H Beef Club, she encouraged the club to donate the funds raised at the upcoming Prince Albert Regional 4-H Beef Show and Sale to the Foundation's 4D CT Simulator Community Campaign.

The charity steer auction raised an amazing \$49,390. This was matched by Malcolm Jenkins from Prince Albert Canadian Tire and the JGL Group of Companies. In total, over \$150,000 was raised for the new 4D CT Simulator at the Saskatoon Cancer Centre.

Jody, now nearly one-year cancer-free, never used the 4D CT simulator as it arrived after his treatment. But in a twist of fate, a family member who developed throat cancer in 2022 had imaging from the simulator to assist in their radiation therapy.

"It was a really big deal for us that we had done something that helped another family member, because without the 4-H auction, the new simulator might not have been operational for him to use it. That was the purpose — we wanted to give back and provide hope," said Jackie.

Norman Beirnes


orm Beirnes has a witty and very kibitzing sense of humour. Humour is the medicine that has supported him to his 91st year.

Norm grew up in Asquith,
Saskatchewan. He married the love
of his life, Joan, in 1956 and worked
for CN Railway, but decided to take
night classes in math to keep his
mind sharp. Norm graduated from
the University of Saskatchewan,
Regina Campus with a Masters
in 1969. He taught for 26 years
as an assistant professor in the
Department of Mathematics and
Statistics at the University of
Regina, while Joan continued her
successful career with CIBC in
human resources for 35 years.

Norm makes no bones about why he became a philanthropist. Joan, Norm's beloved wife of 53 years, was diagnosed with brain cancer in 2004. The treatments and care that she received from the Allan Blair Cancer Centre extended her quality of life for five-and-a-half years.

Joan's passing in 2010 changed Norm's life profoundly, and his gratitude for Joan's care has been a major catalyst for Norm's philanthropy. His generosity shines through his favourite way to donate, a gift-in-kind of securities in memory of Joan, which offers great capital gains tax relief as well.

But Norm's generosity doesn't stop there as he is very familiar with the final taxes his estate will incur on his stock portfolio. He has left a bequest in his Will to the Cancer Foundation of Saskatchewan that will be his ultimate legacy for both Joan and himself.

Making Spirits Bright

Sarah Lowenberger of Calder, SK was diagnosed with stage 4 breast cancer in May 2021. Her diagnosis meant she had to make the tough decision to close her shop, Saranity Esthetics in Roblin, MB, after 20 years of serving her community.

While receiving chemotherapy treatments at the Allan Blair Cancer Centre in Regina, she saw firsthand just how much these treatments can take a toll on cancer patients. As Sarah wrote to her cancer, "You may have breached my body and entered without permission, but I am strong and you can't touch my soul." While Sarah may have had to close her dear store, she turned the closure into a way to brighten the spirits of patients going through treatments during the holiday season.

Sarah packaged up almost \$1,000 worth of items from her shop into 26 gift bags — items like lotion, chocolate, makeup and candles. These gift bags were handed out by Saskatchewan Cancer Agency staff at the Allan Blair Cancer Centre to patients who could use a little extra joy.

Comfort During Treatment

ancer treatments just got a little more comfortable thanks to an incredible group of people!

Motivated by their own personal reasons and supported by their friends and families, they were vital in upgrading chemotherapy treatment chairs from manual recliners to power recliners. These power recliners allow patients and nurses to adjust the position of the chair easily with the push of a button!

These brand new chairs also have two side tables, which for someone who spends many hours and many days in these chairs receiving their chemotherapy treatments, means more room to bring items to comfort them and help pass the time.

In total, there were 29 chairs replaced at the Saskatoon Cancer Centre and the Allan Blair Cancer Centre in Regina.

Now, when a patient receives care, they will be as comfortable as possible, and grateful, knowing someone cared enough to donate a new chair.


Patient Care & Comfort: Ease the Burden of Cancer

ou can ease the burden for cancer patients.



HDR Brachytherapy Community Campaign: Targeted Internal Radiation Therapy

igh Dose Rate (HDR) Brachytherapy is the delivery of internal radiation, and is critical in the treatment of cancers such as prostate, cervical and endometrial.

Thanks to you, more than \$1 million dollars has been donated and only \$250,000 more is needed to upgrade and replace the HDR Brachytherapy equipment for both the Saskatoon Cancer Centre and the Allan Blair Cancer Centre in Regina.

Melina was only 33-years old when she learned that she had stage 3 cervical cancer last spring. After chemotherapy and radiation treatments, she received HDR Brachytherapy to ensure that all of the cancerous cells were gone. Patients like Melina are relying on new HDR Brachytherapy equipment.



Regina Cancer Patient Lodge: Home Away From Home

he Regina Cancer Patient Lodge (Lodge) is a home away from home for cancer patients from across southern and central Saskatchewan. Located across the street from the Allan Blair Cancer Centre, any patient can stay here for \$40 per night and receive three home-cooked meals each day. The convenience and affordability are a welcome reprieve for those receiving treatments in Regina.

But the Lodge is 37 years old and has never had an upgrade, and help is needed to ensure it is here for another 37 years. The Foundation put a call out for help and you responded by donating over \$1.2 million!

This will go a long way to help replace the old furnishings in the guest rooms including the original bathroom fixtures, the windows and the flooring.

New LED lighting will be installed to not only brighten up the space, but improve efficiencies for operating costs. The roof that started to leak will be replaced this summer!

Work has already begun at the Lodge — in fact, the urgently-needed elevator to provide access to the guest rooms on the second floor was installed last year! Stay tuned to see your gifts in action.
