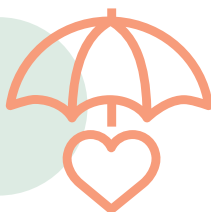

Supporting Young Adults through Responsive, *Timely Community Programming*

With the generous support provided by the **South Saskatchewan Vital Community Fund**, SaskAbilities in Swift Current can continue to support its Take Charge program. The program creates responsive and timely support for young adults aged 18-30 with mental health needs as they transition into the workforce.

With strained provincial mental health services, especially in rural areas of the province, finding flexible support from licensed psychologists and experienced professionals can be highly inaccessible for many young people – who were disproportionately affected by the Covid19 pandemic. The Take Charge program provides a variety of supportive programming to help those affected by mental health needs. Timely access to services has increased participants’

understanding of positively addressing their mental health needs and allowed them to build sustainable coping strategies. The program aims to develop pre-employment skills and promote confidence and positive coping strategies in participants.

Creating Invaluable Summer *Memories for Children with Disabilities*

Inclusion Moose Jaw is creating joyful summer memories for children with disabilities and creating a community of advocacy! With \$3,200 in funding from the Moffat Family Fund, Inclusion Moose Jaw can provide individual and

tailored support to young people in their Foundations for Life - Summer Developmental Program.

With individual support for each participant, the children always have a dedicated person to navigate their day with. In addition, this support also translates as disability-informed advocacy while engaging with the community – spreading invaluable educational tools about less visible disabilities that affect people's daily lives but are often misunderstood.

This program covers the costs of day camps and activities as well as the costs of individual support. The funding from the Moffat Family Fund means that Inclusion Moose Jaw can expand its programming to allow traditionally underserved children the opportunity to access tailored support systems and access to engaging summer programming outside of the education system – which does not provide support through the summer months.

Understanding the Impact of *Agriculture Through Play*

Our landscape is one of fields and industry, and Agriculture in the Classroom strives to give insight into agriculture to young learners across the province. With an increased demand for in-person learning since the pandemic, the \$10,000 grant from the **G. Murray and Edna Forbes Foundation Fund** in 2022, will provide the space to develop and expand several exciting programs for Regina and the surrounding area for the 2023 fiscal year.

Agriculture in the Classroom provides high-quality, engaging, and inquiry-based educational offerings to teachers that enhance their knowledge of agriculture while meeting curriculum requirements. Focusing on science, creativity, sustainability, stewardship, and food security, their programs will reach 10,000 students from kindergarten to grade 12 during the 2023 fiscal

year, providing future stewards with diverse and engaging education about sustainability, waste diversion, the relationship between agriculture and natural habitats, and reducing pollution by creating engaging (and sometimes silly) modalities around soil health, decomposition, composting, and food cycles.

During this year's Canadian Ag Literacy Month, AITC reached over 8000 students and coordinated around 200 Volunteers from the sector who shared their experiences with this year's theme of 'land stewardship.' The G. Murray and Edna Forbes Foundation Fund – which prioritizes environmental and educational projects – supported the additional outreach to Southern Saskatchewan and provided much-needed resources to rural areas of the province.

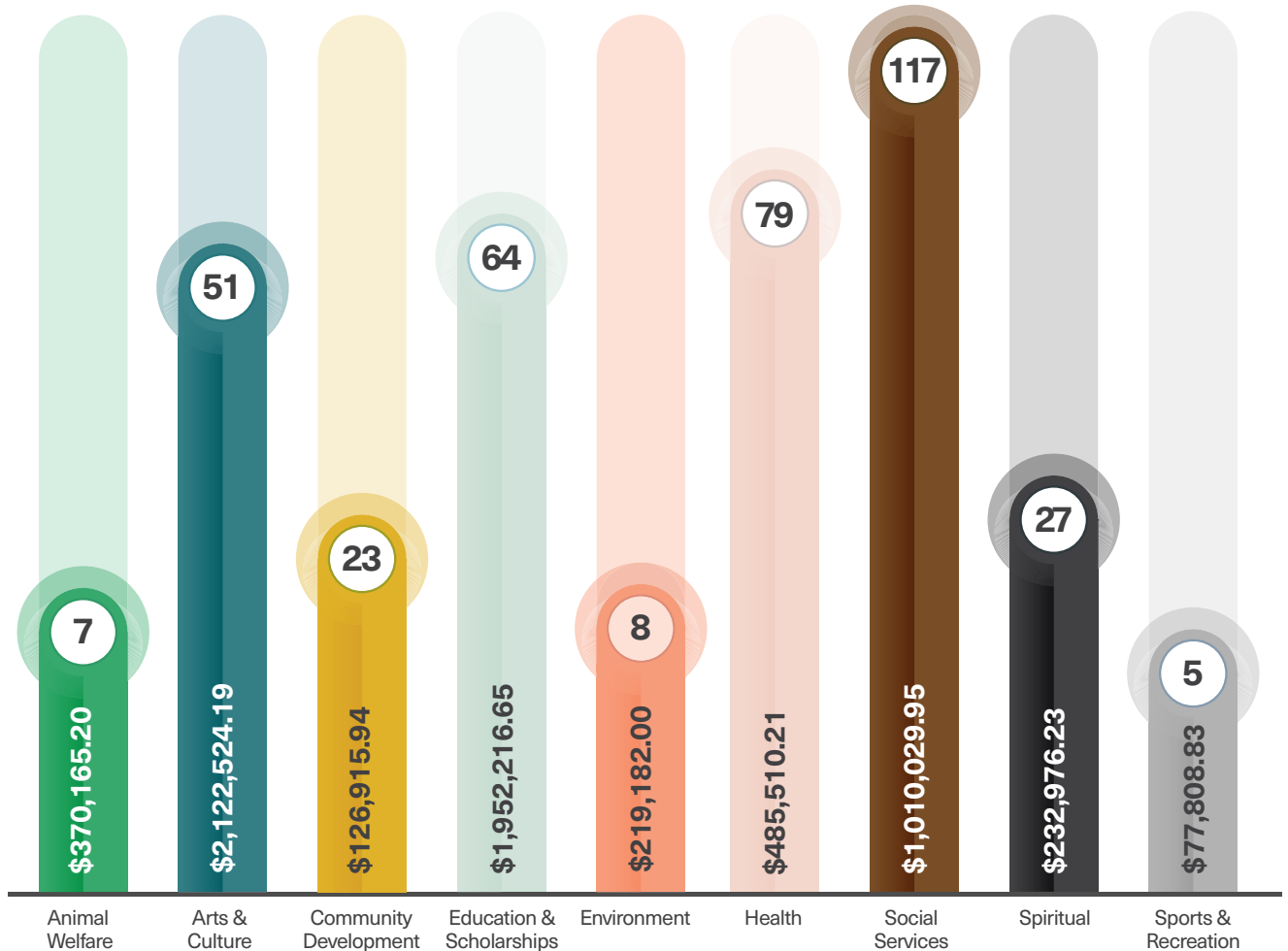

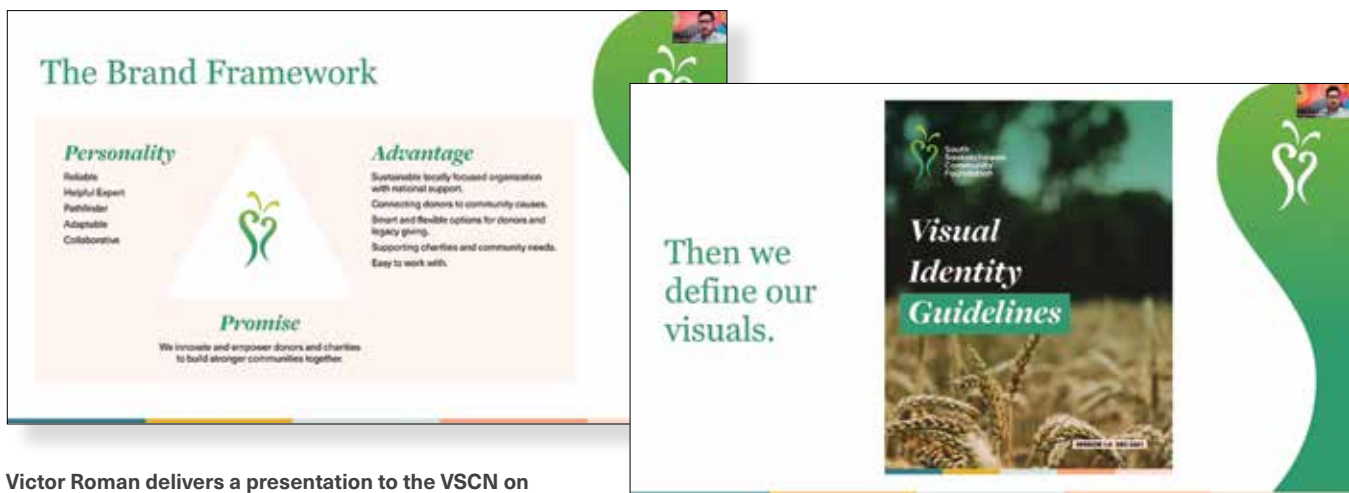

Workshop Series

Fundamentals of Finance: Best Practices for Grassroots Groups **May 24, 2022**

Regardless of organizational size, financial literacy is a critical component of running nonprofits in a responsible and accountable manner. This workshop covered key areas of accountability, including financial policies and best practices to use when building an annual operating budget. Attendees examined basic accounting concepts including how to read, interpret, and understand financial reports that are required to adequately and effectively carry out their financial responsibilities and satisfy legal requirements.

Effective Recruitment & Retention: Attracting (and keeping!) Staff & Volunteer Talent **June 1, 2022**

An important part of nonprofit management lies within effective organizational recruitment and retention for both staff and volunteers (including board members). This workshop explored key aspects of human resource and volunteer management including concepts related to attracting and retaining resources that a nonprofit requires. The concepts examine how nonprofits can maximize the retention of the organizations' most valued asset – our employees and our volunteers.

Navigating your career! **September 28, 2022**

This workshop featured an interactive panel discussion and Q & A with community leaders who have spent most of their lives serving the public, delivering community programs, and advocating for change. Panelists shared wisdom they sometimes learned the hard way, reflecting on the following prompt:

“What I know now that I wish I knew earlier in my career.”

The session was moderated by Donna Ziegler, Executive Director of the South Saskatchewan Community Foundation. Panelists were: Pam Bellanger with Eagle Heart Centre (also known as Aboriginal Family Services); Bonnie Morton, who continues to volunteer for the Regina Anti-Poverty Ministry after a lifetime advocating for people experiencing poverty, and Steve McLellan, who recently retired from the Saskatchewan Chamber of Commerce.

Identifying and Addressing Microaggressions With Ricardo Arisnabarretta-Montejo **October 27, 2022**

Microaggressions are everyday verbal and nonverbal slights, snubs, or insults (either intentional or unintentional), that communicate negative or hostile attitudes towards any individual but that disproportionately affect culturally marginalized and racialized groups. From a language

perspective, this workshop looked at what micro-aggressions are and how they manifest. This workshop also presented ideas on how we can respond to them as a recipient, as someone who has committed a microaggression, and as a witness to one.

Navigating Allyship: Showing Up as an Effective Ally **November 23, 2022**

In today's world, it's not enough to be a bystander - we have to be proactive, taking part in learning opportunities and many uncomfortable conversations that can help us on our journey to navigating effective allyship. In this session, individuals from a wide array of diverse backgrounds shared their insights and stories to open up a dialogue on how to find our voice, amplify others, and act as allies in workplaces and in the community.

Panelists were Sharon Kambale, Chasity Delorme, and Dr. Fritz Pino. The session was moderated by Aria Ramdeo.

Her parents, David and Dorene Steele, continue Desirée's generosity by supporting and moderating the fund – which will start giving back next year. Starting with her own high school and building the scholarship over time, this fund doesn't prioritize high grades; instead, this legacy fund will help remove systemic barriers and support underserved, marginalized, and community-minded students in pursuing post-secondary education – which Desirée saw as a key to building intergenerational joy and success.

Desirée chose the SSCF through the recommendation of a friend. She and her parents are incredibly grateful for the professional and expeditious process which allowed Desirée to set up the fund before her passing. With this fund in place, Desirée will always be remembered as a compassionate mentor and bold advocate for positive change in our province by building educational access for the future's hopeful students. While the fund is just one expression of her giving spirit, it is a beautiful legacy that will profoundly impact the communities she tirelessly advocated for.

Leaving the Community *Better Than They Found It* – Doug and Gloria Archer's Giving Perspective.

Doug's philosophy on community care is to always leave a space better than how you found it.

Doug and Gloria Archer have had a long life of community service. In planning for their legacy, it was vital for them to build a fund that could continue supporting their values generations into the future. AN EXAMPLE STOCKS SCENARIO*

You bought \$1,000 of stock in Apple Inc. years ago. Those stocks are now worth \$10,000. If you were to cash them out, you must pay capital gains tax on 50% of the \$9,000 return. This means **you would owe \$1,733 and the total in your pocket, after tax, would be \$8,267.**

The best part about this scenario is that **the full \$10,000 lives on, forever, through your endowed funds.** We protect the principle and pay out the interest earned, forever, to the causes and charities you care about.

Based on the past 10 years (2011-2021), SSCF's returns have been just over 7% net of investment fees. This means on average, **every year, \$350 to \$500 is available to the charities and community causes you care about.**

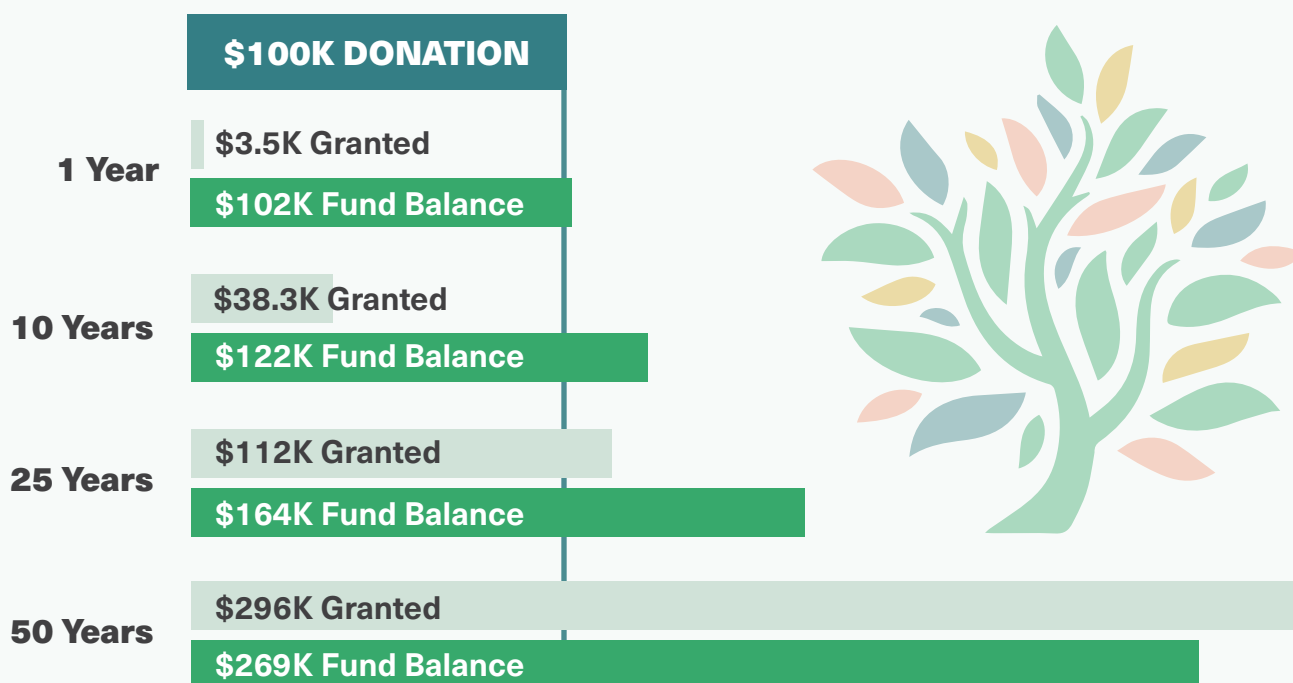
