### Project Outcomes and Lessons Learned:

- Youth preferred the small group settings, but larger groups for physical and more active activities
- Youth were experiencing a lot of anxiety initially, but this diminished as the sessions progressed
- More likely to be active is encouraged as part of the session
- Healthy eating and food choices was a life skill many sought

#### Storytelling:

"Imagine not being able to attend a full session without crying and having to take a time out due to feeling overwhelmed, slowly building confidence, starting to find your voice and participating during an activity, joining a team in an Escape Room activity, and taking the lead as you worked to get everyone out in a timely manner. The picture of her smile as they exited the room and everyone was patting her on the back and congratulating her for being their hero is worth a thousand words."

We are proud to partner with the North Central Family Centre (NCFC) for their Hopes and Dreams Fund campaign. "A gaining of understanding and a working relationship with the Lakota People. Having fun and working together with all people is easier when you can create a work of art with no barriers. Listen and learn is the best form of growing together, and through art there is no barrier but a great language in seeing the finished project. Final product speaks stronger than a thousand words."
