Laying the 'Foundations' for Truth & Reconcilation

Inclusion Regina's Story





Inclusion Regina Round Dance Participants

In 2023-24, Inclusion Regina received \$9,685.15 through the Truth and Reconciliation Fund to support 'Foundations' Indigenous Cultural Programming - consisting of artistic workshops, cultural teachings workshops, an oral storytelling series, and copresenting a round dance with the Newoyotina Friendship Centre. This free and accessible community programming is filling a community gap in programming designed for people experiencing intellectual disabilities that provides Indigenous cultural connection opportunities. 'Foundations' has provided opportunities for Indigenous people with disabilities in the community to forge deeper connections with Indigenous culture, as well as

more opportunities for education for non-Indigenous people in the community.

Jessica Pratt-Longman, Indigenous Cultural Advisor at Inclusion Regina, explains they organized ten 'Sharing the Knowledge' sessions. She says that attendees were able to participate in a wide variety of activities and workshops ranging from: the Seven Sacred Teachings, the Seven Sacred Rights, the tipi teachings, the medicine wheel, missing and murdered Indigenous women (MMIW), Orange Shirt Day, learning how to bead, how to make dreamcatchers, participating in round dances, and the potato dance.

It's like a branch.
It's like a look into the Indigenous world and that branch is connected to massive trees that have deep roots.

Pratt-Longman goes on to express that the program is meant to be a steppingstone into Indigenous culture, stating, "It's bringing our folks into a space that they're familiar with, with a program they're familiar with, and faces they are familiar with. And then bringing them small pieces of culture in small doses... It's like a branch. It's like a look into the Indigenous world and that branch is connected to massive trees that have deep roots. And if people want to reach out to that branch and continue that journey - that's the hope."

Luther College had the privilege of partnering with the Foundation on the 2023 Vital Signs Report. Through this partnership, we mapped the local research to the UN Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). By incorporating the UN SDGs, the report provides a valuable framework for understanding local challenges within a global context. This will help us focus our efforts on creating a more sustainable and equitable future for southern Saskatchewan.



Phoenix Residential Society HOMES Program Supported

Anonymous Donor's Story of Hope



For over 40 years, Phoenix Residential Society has provided residential and case management services to individuals in a variety of different programs. They serve individuals with major mental illness, substance use disorders, cognitive and developmental disabilities, acquired brain injuries, and those experiencing chronic homelessness. Their services range from providing community-based supports to 24-hour staffed apartment buildings.

The HOMES Housing First program provides intensive supports to individuals who have experienced homelessness and have a variety of very complex needs. They are currently supporting 62 individuals who were living on the streets for many years, prior to coming into the program.

After Phoenix Residential Society reached out to SSCF seeking financial support to sustain this crucial program in 2023, an anonymous donor through the Foundation awarded a significant donation towards the HOMES Housing First program.

HOMES Success Story:

This is the journey of one of our now graduated individuals. When we first met them, this individual struggled with the experience of homelessness, substance use, trauma, and aggression that led to frequent interactions with Regina Police Services. For years, their life was marked by instability and they often found themselves in conflict with others due to their aggressive behaviour. Their future seemed uncertain.

With the help of the HOMES program, they found a stable place to call home and they were finally able to focus on their personal growth and well-being. The HOMES program's support did not just stop at housing; it extended to providing access to mental health services, substance use treatment, and life skills training.

Once settled into their new home, the positive changes became evident. Without the daily stress of survival on the streets, they had the mental space to reflect on their past and set new goals for the future. Over time, the transformation was remarkable. The anger and

aggression that once defined them began to subside. They learned effective communication skills, conflict resolution strategies, and emotional regulation techniques. As their self-esteem grew, they started envisioning a different life for themselves.

After years of hard work and dedication, they graduated from the **HOMES Housing First** program. They had not only maintained their housing, but had also rebuilt their life from the ground up. Today, they live independently in their own house within the community, surrounded by a network of friends and mentors who continue to uplift and support them and in turn. this individual now lends their support to others.



Honouring the life of Roberto Roman Guerrero.

The Roberto Roman Memorial Fund



The Roberto Roman Memorial Fund was established in memory of a loved family and community member, Roberto Roman Guerrero, who led an extraordinary life and was blessed by an equally extraordinary and loving family. His son (our staff member Victor) along with Victor's siblings, created the Fund in celebration of their beloved father after his passing in August 2023, ensuring a lasting tribute to Roberto's name, treasured memories, and his values of compassion and community service. Donations to this legacy fund will grow and give back to charitable causes in Weyburn and surrounding communities, forever. This means his name, and his impact on those in need, will live on in perpetuity. If you have the opportunity to meet Victor, we encourage you to learn more about the amazing life of Roberto.

Roberto's life is a fascinating story that is too long to capture in a few words. He was born in Santiago, Chile in 1946. He played professional basketball in Chile for a brief period as a young adult. He lived in Moscow, Russia for five years to achieve a degree in Agricultural Engineering. He then worked as an Agricultural Engineer in Chile.

During this time he met his wife, Ingri, who he married in 1973. He later became a father to Alexis (1973) and Jacqueline (1974).

On September 11, 1973, Chile's history changed forever when a democratically elected government was overthrown by a dictatorship that lasted until 1990. During the time of the dictatorship, Roberto was wrongfully targeted and imprisoned twice, until eventually escaping the country as a refugee.

He sought refuge in Canada where he arrived in 1976. Ingri and their children followed shortly after. He settled in Weyburn, Saskatchewan where he lived out the rest of his life and grew their family including David, Victor, and his grandchildren.

Roberto was able to visit Chile several times in the 1990s and 2000s. However, it wasn't until 2015, nearly 40 years after fleeing Chile, when Roberto was reconnected with his cousins, nephews, and niece in Chile, creating loving relationships with a family he lost long ago. Being able



to finally rekindle these relationships brought Roberto a sense of joy, comfort, and fulfillment that is impossible to capture in words.

Roberto and Ingri were always involved in the Weyburn community together. He became a Spanish teacher, volunteered with the Knights of Columbus, St. Vincent de Paul Catholic Church, Amnesty International, Meals on Wheels, and helped other refugee and immigrant families settle in the community. He and Ingri also (unofficially) adopted several youth and families to give them a supportive family during times of need.

Roberto spoke three languages: Spanish, Russian, and English. He lived on three continents. He faced more adversity than most people in his life, yet he approached every day with peace, calmness, and genuine happiness and appreciation for those around him. He taught his loved ones the values of patience, gratitude, and unconditional love.

Roberto's family has created the Roberto Roman Memorial Fund to honour his life, his values, and his commitment to supporting his community.

Since 1977, the Regina Early Learning Centre (RELC) has been changing young lives while creating a community of care that makes the city a better place for everyone. Founder Anne Luke saw the need to help children and their families in the vitally important early years. She knew that making a difference at the very start changes lives forever. The organization began in partnership with caregivers as a preschool program for 10 children and has since grown to serve over 250 vulnerable children and their families through a variety of programs. It also serves hundreds more through the Regina Early Years Family Resource Centre and the Regina Perinatal Health Network.

Anne recognized the disparity among young children in our community and wanted to ensure equal opportunity for all children. She knew education was a key in starting new cycles to lift families out of poverty and she empowered caregivers to have input in their child's education through intentional and respectful collaboration and partnership.

That founding idea and mission has driven the RELC for over four decades and it has had a tremendous impact on the lives of children and their families in Regina. Luke passed away in November 2022, but her legacy and vision lives on daily at the RELC through its many programs and services.

Donations to this legacy fund will give back to the Regina Early Learning Centre programming for many years to come, helping children in our community establish the foundation for a love of learning and setting them on a path for lifelong success, and at the same time helping their caregivers become the best caregivers they can be.
